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# **Delivering Results**

While we've worked in many countries, our flagship programs have taken place across the Philippines. For nearly a decade, IMPL. PROJECT has operated in the Philippines, collecting and analyzing data to better understand the needs and challenges facing "last mile" communities in every corner of the country including in Sulu, Lanao del Norte, Lanao del Sur, Cagayan, Zambales, and Northern Luzon. We've used that data and insight to design interventions on behalf of our clients that meet their needs, while also delivering immediate impact to our partner communities. The map to the riaht demonstrates our primary areas of operation. With this extensive reach, we are able to address key vulnerabilities in a wide variety of Philippines communities.



IMPL. PROJECT Philippines Programming Presence

One of our flagship programs is the Unified Livelihoods Agriculture Cooperative (ULAC). ULAC operates in Masinloc, Zambales, about 125 miles from Scarborough Shoal, and is focused on strengthening the resilience of the local fishing industry and the community it supports. ULAC currently includes 18 commercial fishing captains and 60 total beneficiaries. They host regular meetings and training events on topics including maritime safety, basic life support, financial management, and reporting illegal fishing. Beginning in 2021, IMPL. PROJECT collected thousands of surveys and identified two key drivers of livelihoods insecurity for the fisherfolk: 1) Climate-related weather challenges. 2) Hostile Chinese influence in parts of the West Philippine Sea (WPS) that have historically been utilized by Filipino fisherfolk. In the first three months of the cooperative's existence, the fishing captains' average household incomes increased by 50%. Since then, their profits have been steadily growing. Last year, the cooperative had enough revenue to buy two new payaos (fish aggregating devices), which will help them reestablish a foothold in the WPS. ULAC also funds and distributes food subsidies to members during stretches of bad weather, which prohibit safe fishing activity.
